#### Scene Setting

- There is currently no universal "right to access the internet"
- But there are debates about:
  - whether internet access should be a right
  - how and why human rights matter online
  - what access to the internet means
  - internet rights declarations and charters
  - .... and many related topics
- New global agreements about HR and internet....

#### UN Resolution June 29 2012

- 1. Affirms that the <u>same rights</u> that people have <u>offline</u> must also be protected <u>online</u>, in particular **freedom of expression**, which is applicable regardless of frontiers and through any media of one's choice.....
- 2. *Recognizes* the global and open nature of the Internet as a driving force in accelerating progress towards development in its various forms;
- 3. Calls upon all States to promote and facilitate access to the Internet and international cooperation aimed at the development of media and information and communications facilities in all countries;

### Scene setting

- Simple idea: the same rights we have offline apply online
- Governments' obligations: take steps to ensure access, including:
  - access to technical infrastructure and ICTS
  - access to content
  - accessibility for disabled persons and diverse groups

## Challenges and opportunities

- Complacency: we're ok here
- NZ voices largely absent from global debates
- Specific access and rights issues:
  - Digital inclusion and accessibility
  - Rights attrition: Privacy, FX and FA (eg Megaupload)
  - Security and safety
  - Multi-stakeholder governance
- Internet public policy: WHOIS, Registrars and LEA requests, ITU negotiations...
